Foundational Principles

Intersectionality: The Care Frame requires storytellers to recognize their identities in the telling of the story, including an understanding of where their identities situate them in these power frameworks.

Recognition of power in gender-based violence: GBV exists because of unequal power. Understanding and recognizing this power framework is crucial to telling the story care-fully.

"Cultivating caring relations" (Held, 2006): The storyteller should seek to develop caring relations with survivors or victims' families in the stories they are telling, recognizing the critical aspects of trust and narrative nuance that shape this.

It's never a survivor/victim's fault: People who cause gendered harm are responsible for their own actions.

What is this Care Frame?

Within the Care Frame, true crime narratives become meaningful steps towards a safer world. This tool helps creators build stories that honor the lives affected by these cases while still engaging audiences with skillful storytelling, just like a painter working within the edges of a canvas. The Care Frame doesn't limit the art; it elevates it.
